Chapter Books (J)

Amato, Mary. Edgar Allan's Official Crime Investigation.

Edgar has it all covered in his "crime investigation notebook"--but so does Patrick Chen, who has copied Edgar and is trying to solve the case first.

Bergen, Lara. Sophie the Awesome.

Sophie Miller's life is boring. Average. Blah. She's not the oldest or the youngest, the tallest or the shortest. She's not even the only Sophie in her third-grade class! Sophie knows she's special. Can Sophie prove her awesomeness . . . and prove everyone wrong?
