Teen Volunteers Needed for Summer Library Club

All three locations of the Upper Arlington Public Library are seeking teen volunteers for this year's "On Your Mark, Get Set, READ!" Summer Library Club.

Interns

Teens entering grades 10-12 or who graduate high school in 2016 are eligible to be an intern. The positions involve a commitment of 8-10 hours per week from May 23 – July 31. Applicants will be required to write an essay and be interviewed.

Those chosen will gain valuable leadership and career skills by training junior volunteers, assisting with programming and collection needs, and other duties as assigned. Internships are unpaid but selected students will receive recognition, letters of recommendation and service hour credit for their participation.

High school intern applications will be available Friday, April 1 and are due Sunday, May 1.

Great Women in Art History: Mary Cassatt
