From the Director

As you know, on April 10 the Upper Arlington Public Library became a part of the Central Library Consortium. This change has expanded the collection available to Upper Arlington Library cardholders to over 4.7 million physical items. In the first three months that this larger collection has been available,



UA customers have had almost 30,000 items sent to their UA branch from other library systems. One comment I've heard is that reserves are coming faster than before.

The most common question I've had is whether items checked out at a UAPL Branch can be returned to a Columbus Metropolitan Library branch. The answer is yes — you may return items checked out at one of our three locations to any branch of the other 13 library systems in the Central Library Consortium. If our branches are not convenient, the closest others are Grandview Heights Public Library, or the Hilliard and Whetstone Branches of the Columbus Metropolitan Library system. If you want to pick up your items at a UA Library, be sure to log in to the catalog through our website at www. ualibrary.org when placing your request. This is the only way you'll be able to choose one of our branches as your pick up location.

Don't have an Upper Arlington Public Library card? You can sign up for one on our website and pick it up at one of our branches. By using your UAPL card at the UAPL catalog, your reserves will be filled by UAPL-owned items before they are shared with customers from the other CLC member library systems.

If you've made the move to digital, we have that, too.
Again, be sure to log in to our shared Digital Downloads
eBook collection by selecting the Upper Arlington Public
Library as your library with your UAPL card number and PIN.
We recently added titles that only UAPL cardholders can
access. To see these and other titles, you will need to log in
before you can search for eBooks.

Finally, it's time to take a look at our newsletter. We invite you to take our survey regarding the distribution and contents of *Library Link*. Your input will help us make sure you are getting the information you want about the library in the format you prefer. From the Board President

In mid-July the library learned how much state money it would receive as a result of the mid biennium budget review. Since libraries across the state shared in the budget cuts needed when state revenues fell short of projections in the 2008-2009 recession, we had thought we would share in the



growth as well now that the economy is doing better.

Unfortunately, Upper Arlington's allocation from the state for the next 12 months is virtually unchanged from the previous 12 months. In fact, the amount of state funding we will receive this year is 24% below what it was in 2008.

Our goal is to continue to provide our residents with the services they expect from their library with the resources available. UA Library taxes are below those of most surrounding communities. We hope to keep it that way. To that end, the Library Board and staff are engaged in a three part strategy:

- Cut expenses while protecting core services.
- Look for other sources of revenue, including growing our private fundraising.
- Work with our area legislators to restore state funds to libraries in the next biennial budget.

We will share more details about this effort over the next several months. The library board and staff are committed to doing our part to continue to make good use of taxpayer dollars. We will work diligently to make sure the State of Ohio does its part as well.

News and Views

Fine Payment by Credit Card is Here

Patrons can now pay their fines and fees using a credit card online. Due to security restrictions, patrons are only able to do this outside of the library's network, such as on a home computer or through a cellular data connection. To pay your fines, log in to your account through our website and click "Fines and Fees" in the sidebar on the right. Check the boxes of the fines you wish to pay, then click Pay Fines Now. If you have no fines, no option to pay will appear. Note that your credit card number will not be stored in our system and no staff member will have access to it.

Lot by Main Library Closes Aug. 25; Friends Labor Day Sale to End Early

Due to the major reconstruction of the Northam Park parking lot, heavy construction will take place in front of the Main Library for a period of several weeks beginning in late August. The library's side of the lot will be closed, along with the building's front entrance. Patrons will be directed to an alternative entrance and exit. Due to this inconvenience, the Friends of the UAPL Summer Book Sale will end on Saturday, August 30 rather than the traditional time on Labor Day.

Whatever information you need, our knowledgeable staff can help you find the answer. Library patrons also have online access to our many research databases from home.

Getting published

We carry important reference titles, like *Literary Market Place* and *The Writer's Legal Guide*. These and many other works dedicated to helping writers get published are always available in our Main Library's Reference Department.

Marketing

In addition to writing a wonderful book, authors are also being asked to do more and more marketing. From book trailers on YouTube to blogs, tweets, and social media, modern authors have to know more about technology than how to use a word processor. That's where expert help from your library comes in.

The UAPL has resources and staff to help you access and use important software, social media, and more. Our main building has iMac computers with Adobe Photoshop, Adobe InDesign, and iMovie to help you create a visual masterpiece to go with your literary one. If you're unfamiliar with Photoshop, we have tutorials through an online database — the LearningExpress Library — to get you up to speed. All of our branches have PCs with internet and database access, as well as Microsoft Office for your researching and writing needs.




The Dog Stars by Peter Heller




Monster on the Hill by Rob Harrell


