Amor Towles is the 2018 Upper Arlington Author Series Speaker

mor Towles, author of *A Gentleman in Moscow* and *Rules of Civility*, will be the featured speaker at the 2018 Upper Arlington Author Series on Sunday, October 14 at 2 p.m. at Upper Arlington High School. A VIP reception will be held before the talk at 11:30 a.m. at the Amelita Mirolo Barn.

The reception serves as a fundraiser for the Ann Royce Moore Fund at the Upper Arlington Community Foundation. This meet-and-greet event will include catered food and drinks, and a chance to chat with the author.

Amor Towles' presentation at the high school will last approximately 45-60 minutes, with Q&A following. A book

signing will complete the afternoon. Both of his novels will be available for purchase from Gramercy Books, which will donate 20% of sales revenue to the Ann Royce Moore Fund. Can't wait for your copies? Buy now at www.gramercybooksbexley.com, and the store will donate 20% of your online purchase.

Towles' first novel, *Rules of Civility*, published in 2011, was a *New York Times* bestseller and was named by the *Wall Street Journal* as one of the best books of 2011. *A Gentleman in Moscow*, published in 2016, has been on the *New York Times* bestseller list for over a year and was named one of the best books of 2016 by *The Chicago Tribune*, *The Washington Post*, *The Philadelphia Inquirer*, *The San Francisco Chronicle*, and NPR. The novel has been optioned to be made into a TV miniseries.




