Main Library Offers U.S. Passport Processing

We are pleased to announce that the Upper Arlington Public Library now accepts passport applications on behalf of the U.S. Department of State.

Citizens of the United States planning international travel can schedule passport appointments on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays between the hours of 2-5 p.m. and 6-8 p.m. Appointments are also available on Saturday mornings between the hours of 10 a.m. – 1 p.m. This service is currently only offered at the Main Library.

Applicants need to bring:

- Completed DS-11 application form
- Proof of U.S. citizenship
- A current driver's license or military I.D.
- One recent color 2" x 2" photograph (the library can take a photo for you)

Fees for the service are as follows:

- Adult Passport Book \$110
- Adult Passport Card \$30
- Minor Passport Book \$80
- Minor Passport Card \$15
- Execution Fee \$ 25
- Photo Fee \$10

Hearing Loop Installed in Friends Theater

Thanks to recent donations, the Main Library's Friends Theater is now equipped with a hearing loop. Users of compatible T-coil hearing aids will be able to receive audio directly from the room's PA system, drastically reducing background noise and allowing individual adjustment of volume level.

To use this system, hearing aid users should switch to "T-Mode" or "T+M" mode.

NorWest Flower Show Returns to the Main Library

NorWest Garden Clubs are sponsoring "Autumn Joy," a Standard Flower Show which will be held at the Upper Arlington Main Library on October 22-23. The show will feature three divisions: horticulture, design and special exhibits. Special exhibits feature educational exhibits and garden photography.

The first NorWest Flower Show was held in 1951 with more than 20 sponsoring clubs. Shows were held annually in the Upper Arlington area for almost 30 years. The number of garden clubs in the area has decreased, with the current show being sponsored by just four clubs.

Wicked Columbus with Author David Meyers

In the early 20th century, the "Bad Lands" of Columbus were once as well-know at New York's "Tenderloin," Chicago's "Black Belt," or Detroit's "Heights," and its uncrowned king was Alexander "Smoky" Hobbs. However, vice was not confined to one neighborhood as exemplified by the unlikely love affair between local gambler Pat Murnan and Grace Backenstoe, the madam of the most popular brothel in town. Corruption was rampant during this era, extending all the way from city hall to the statehouse to Washington D.C., and Roxie Stinson, a local music teacher with the chorus girl figure, played a key role in bringing it all to light. 





Library Levy Rewewal FAQ

On November 8, the Upper Arlington Public Library is seeking a renewal of our existing operating levy. Here are answers to some questions you may have about the levy. More detailed information will be available this fall.

Q: What is the Library asking for on the November 8 ballot?

A: We are seeking a six-year renewal of the existing 2-mill operating levy. The levy was first approved by Upper Arlington voters in May 2007 and was renewed in 2012. It would generate approximately 54% of the funds needed to operate our library system over the next six years.

Q: Will this raise my property taxes?


A: No. It is a renewal levy, so your taxes will be assessed at the same rate as they have been since 2007. Currently Upper Arlington homeowners are paying \$56.47 per \$100,000 of home value to support the Upper Arlington Public Library. This is just 2% of the total property taxes Upper Arlington homeowners pay.

Q: Why is this needed? Don't you get funds from the state?

A: We do receive funds from the State of Ohio's Public Library Fund. However, in 2009 our state funding was cut by 18% and has never been recouped. State funds now make up less than half of what is needed to serve our community. We rely on local funding now more than ever. Upper Arlington voters have supported our local library since 1992 with a local property tax levy in addition to State Funding.

Q: Can you get money in other ways? What about cutting costs?

A: We pursue supplemental funding whenever we can, such as providing fee-based services to other libraries, collecting fees for passport processing, and through private donations and grants. We also belong to several consortia that provide opportunities to save money on items and services we purchase. We continually review our operations to look for ways to save money. For example, by upgrading our lighting and HVAC systems, purchasing utilities through co-operative contracts, and joining the City and Schools to publish the *UA Insight* newsletter, we are saving almost \$80,000 per year.
